Confession and Absolution in the 21st Century

August 2018

In The Small Catechism, Luther asked and answered his own question: "What is Confession? Confession has two parts: First, that we confess our sins, and second, that we receive absolution, that is forgiveness, from the pastor as from God Himself, not doubting, but firmly believing that by it our sins are forgiven before God in heaven."

I heard this loudly and clearly in my confirmation class as Pastor Schmidt explained to us that he was not the one forgiving us, but that as our pastor, he had the privilege of telling us the good news that God has forgiven our sins and remembers them no more.

When Lutherans think of confession, we may invariably think of the confession we speak together on a Sunday morning. But what happens when that doesn't cut it? We hear the pastor say, "I forgive your sins in the name of the Father and of the (+) Son and of the Holy Spirit" but we can't quite believe it or say "Amen" to it? What happens when we are terrified by a sin that haunts us, whether it is ongoing or something that happened a long time ago?

Then it is best to turn to your pastor or a Christian friend. There are times when we need to hear the absolution specifically with our name on it. The *Lutheran Service Book* addresses this human need on page 292. Confession and absolution may happen formally or informally as the occasion arises. I have heard confessions in my office, in hospital rooms, at the grocery store and in your living rooms and at your kitchen tables. Always, it is a mercy on both sides to share the forgiveness that Christ has won for each of us on the cross.

At his ordination, a pastor vows that he will not divulge the sins confessed to him. Pastor Lee and I have each made that vow. Initially, I worried about what I would think of people when they told me their darkest moments. God handled that for me. While it would take quite a bit to surprise me after 30 years of ministry, I have come to appreciate the fact that these are my brothers and sisters in Christ who are wrestling with sin and temptation and want to hear what Christ has done for them. They want to put their sins behind them and forge ahead. (There is a reason the devil is called "the accuser." Confession and absolution take all the wind out of his sails. If God has forgiven it, the devil can't use it against us anymore.) When a sin is confessed, it is forgiven and it is gone. A sin that is confessed no longer has any power over us.

From the Window View of Pastor Lee

What is a Birthday?



A **birthday** is a day that comes once a year and it should be celebrated for several reasons. A birthday is a time when a person acknowledges the anniversary of his or her birth. In most cultures, birthdays are celebrated in some of the same ways. Often birthdays are celebrated with a gift, party, or some other special act.

A **birthday** is a time to celebrate birth itself. It is an expression of thanks to God for being born and still being alive. It is also an occasion to rethink your life. It is a great time to reflect on the past, evaluate your present and make plans for your future. It is a time when your past intersects with your present and future.

My legal U.S. birthday is August 15th but that's not my real birthday. My real birthday is somewhere in the first week of June. I figured that out because my parents left Laos to Thailand on May 17th and my mother told me I was born three weeks later. In many countries, birthdays are not recorded. Instead, they're remembered by events. For example, my mother would say, "I was about four or five years old when the Japanese invaded Laos and pushed out the French." According to recorded history, Japan invaded Southeast Asia in 1940. According to that, my mother's birth year is around 1935.

I wish I knew my real birthday, but there's good news. I have another birthday that I know for sure; June 7th, 1998 is the day I was born again. That's the day I received God's saving grace. Through faith I believe that the water and His word forgives, renews, and strengthens me to serve Christ.

John 3:3-5— Jesus answered him, "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is born again he cannot see the kingdom of God." A Nicodemus said to him, "How can a man be born when he is old? Can he enter a second time into his mother's womb and be born?" Jesus answered, "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God."

On your birthday, there is a celebration and receiving of gifts. In your baptism, you also celebrate and have received a greater gift, the gift of eternal life by God the father through God the Son and with the power of the God the Spirit. I pray that in good times and in tough times, you give thanks to God and remember how precious your baptism is. If you've ever wondered what I whisper to the children when they come up during communion, this is what I say, <u>"The Lord bless you and keep you and remembers you in your baptism, remember that Jesus loves you."</u>

Mission Team Returns From McGrath, Alaska

This is the sixteenth year that a VBS team has been sent to McGrath, AK by St Paul's Lutheran church in Munster, IN or a combined team from Paul's and King of Kings Lutheran Church, Roseville, MN. This year's combined team included Pam and Mackenzie Collova, Sofia Preciado, and Don Ullman from King of Kings in Roseville, MN and Catherine Arndt from St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Munster, IN and Tim and Hayley Batt from McGrath.

McGrath is located approximately two hundred and fifty miles northwest of Anchorage which requires an hour flight from Anchorage across the Alaska Range of mountains to McGrath. McGrath has a population of about three hundred and fifty people. When the VBS team first went to McGrath the population was five hundred but it has diminished each year and continues to diminish because of the lack of employment.

We held VBS from July 10 to July 14th from 2 PM until 5 PM. The theme of the VBS program was God's Promise on life's wild ride. The key Bible Verse came from 2 Corinthians 1:20, For all the promises of God find their Yes in Him. Over the course of the week 17 children attended at least once. We had a daily attended of 14 or 15 children. Two of the children were from Haiti and were being adopted by a couple in the community. They spoke very little English. Hopefully with the Holy Spirit's help they learned the Gospel message. Attending VBS gave them a opportunity to practice listening and speaking English.

Each day began with an Opening led Sofia which introduced the Take Home Point for the day and the Bible verse for the day and a video with Georde and Adam that introduced the Bible story for the day and a science question. Also the children were introduced to a new song and review songs they had previously learned.

After the opening the children learned the Bible story for the day led by Don. The children participated in telling the story with some children acting it out. Tuesday's Bible story was Moses hidden in the river where God was with Moses. Wednesday's Bible story was about the children of Israel crossing into the Promised Land where God gave them new life. Thursday's Bible Story was Jesus' Baptism where God declared that Jesus was out Savior, Friday's Bible story was about the disciples on the road to Emmaus where the events of Holy Week were reviewed and Jesus explained why he must die and rise again. Saturday's Bible story was about God saving Paul from the Sea when he was ship wrecked while being taken to Rome for trial.

After the Bible story the children made a craft which was led by Mackenzie. Each day's craft was related to the Bible story or the Take Home Point for the day. On Tuesday the children made a basket with baby Moses in it. Wednesday they made a fish. On Thursday they made a mobile with a dove decorated with ribbon and beads representing the Holy Spirit at Jesus' Baptism. On Friday they made a "stained glass" cross using tissue paper. On Saturday they made a boat to remind them of how God saved Paul and everyone on the boat. (Continued...)

After crafts the children went to play games led by Tim and Hayley. The games involved team work and listening to directions. Some f their favorite games were crab walk and Duck, Duck, Gray Duck. They also had an opportunity to sail the boats they made in crafts.

After games the children went to music where Catherine led them in VBS songs. They also learned the Bible verse for the day, and reviewed the Take Home Point for the day.

At the end of music the children were led in a snack prayer before moving to snacks. The snacks were designed by Pam to show something from the day's story. The children loved them and eagerly ate them and drank the Kool aide and water.

At closing each day, the Bible verse, Take Home point and songs they learned that day were reviewed. Also they saw the rest of the video with Georde and Adam giving the truth about the science question. We took prayer requests from the children and prayed asking for God's help according to His will and then closed the day with a prayer.

On Thursday evening we had a Family Movie Night. Three families attended to watch two Veggie Tale movies.

On Friday at the end of the day we had a closing program for parents and the community. Twelve people attended. They were told what their children had learned for the week and listened to several songs sung by the children.

On Sunday after the worship service, the congregation held a pot luck dinner. It was a great way to try some Alaska foods such as Black Bear, Moose, salmon and Alaska Blue Barrie pie and crisp. There were many choices of food to eat. All of it was very good.

His parents were somewhat concerned about the reaction of the rest of the crew when they found out the young man was a Christian. If the image of a lumberjack was true, they were sure his life would be quite unbearable. Upon his return home in the fall, his mother immediately inquired as to what had taken place when the word got out that he was a Christian, to which he replied, "They didn't find out!"

Most of us don't find ourselves in logging camps, but do those around us, wherever we are, know we are Christians? Are they aware that we are God's children?
