Pastor's Corner August 2019

What's a Faith Family Reunion?

As a sinner who lives under the constant love and forgiveness of my Savior, it is no wonder that the parable of the prodigal son is one of my favorite passages in Luke, if not the entire Bible. As we hear Jesus tell the story, we may relate to different characters or events or attitudes as we go through life ourselves. The parable continues to unfold each time we read it. As the oldest child in my family, I first related to the self-righteous older brother who was miffed that his little brother got away with everything. Then, to make things worse, their father even had a party to celebrate his homecoming when sonny-boy came home with his tail between his legs!

Later on, I realized I was the prodigal himself. I knew what I wanted and no one could tell me differently. "Prone to wander, Lord I feel it, prone to leave the God I love." (If it's in the hymnal, it has to be true, right?) Even so, as a Christian, I knew that even when I had really messed things up, I could always come home to a Father who loved me and would forgive me and welcome me.

As we get older, there are times we may feel like the father looking down the road, waiting for his son to return home. (And I don't just mean after curfew.) We raise our children in the faith. Many of them wander off for a while and return home. But some wander off and stay there. Even then, it continues to be our hope that those sons and daughters will one day come home. Another hymn verse ends "and grace will lead me home."

If this is a burden you bear as a mother or father, a brother or sister, even as a son or daughter, you are not alone. How can a child who was raised in the faith, perhaps attended a Lutheran school, settle for what the world has to offer? Or quite frankly, what the world doesn't have to offer? Maybe you have an adult brother or sister who turns away from you if you talk about your faith in Jesus. To have a family member leave the faith can be frustrating and confusing. It may be incomprehensible to you. It may bring pain, embarrassment, guilt or even shame. It may be your best kept secret.

Faith Family Reunion may be the place for you. It was founded by a woman who was raised in a loving Christian home and then fell away.

By the grace of God and the power of the Holy Spirit, she has returned. Faith Family Reunion provides encouragement and provides resources for parents who raised their children in the Lutheran church but whose children have left the church and their faith (prodigals). Summer is a time for family vacation and relaxation. For me, my summer schedule was booked way ahead of time and I will not have any time for family vacation until October. Sometimes that's just the way it is. This is me confirming that the harvest is plentiful.

In June we had Vacation Bible School where over 150 children attended and learned about the God of Creation who sent us Jesus. What an honor it is to train up disciples at such a young age.

In July, we started off with our outreach event at the Hmong Freedom Festival at Como Park in St. Paul where we talked to more than 200 children about Jesus. What a blessing it is to share Jesus with children that have never heard of Him.

The Twin Cities hosted the National Youth Gathering this year in Minneapolis where over 22,000 youth came and learned about their identity in the eyes of God and not by what others say who they are. These youth will go back to their own towns and be on fire for the gospel. My hope is that their excitement and flame does not lose traction.

I attended the LCMS National Convention in Tampa, FL for seven days as the pastoral delegate for our circuit. There I met hundreds of people from all over the nation to make decisions for the future of our church body.

I will be attending the LCMS Hmong annual conference from Aug 1st-4th in St. Paul. This is the gathering of Hmong LCMS churches to encourage and learn about God in their native language and in English. When you are a small group, you must continue to gather to lift each other up.

Two days after that, we will have our Night out to Unite at church to fellowship with our neighbors. This will be a chance to share God's love and possibly conversations about Jesus.

Two weeks after that school will start at King of Kings. Man, don't I get a break?

I am not boasting or complaining. This is the everyday life of a Christian, especially someone who loves mission work. My life as a missionary doesn't involve me going overseas. My mission work is in the daily life that I live and how I impact all those around me. I want people to see and feel God's love when they are with me. I fail at times. I ask for forgiveness and I continue on. My rest will come one day when God calls me home, but until then I want to bring as many people as I can to Christ. My hope and prayer is that you live your life in a way that brings more people to Christ and glory to His name. Even when you're on vacation, you don't stop being a Christian. Share God's love as you go.

LOVING OUR NEIGHBORS WITH THE ROSEVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Pastor Lee recently reached out and asked what Roseville PD's greatest needs

are and how we, the church, can help. The department said, "When our officers get calls about people on the streets, such as veterans and families with children, their hearts go out to them. Most of the time the officers end up buying them food or giving money out of their own pocket." I know we as the church can help. I'd like to start a care package ministry. How can you help? It's so easy, donate any of the following items and drop them off to Pastor Lee: 1-gallon zip top bags, fruit snacks, granola bars, water bottles, socks, hand wipes, chap stick, tooth brushes/paste, Cub/Target Gift Card of any amount, and a hand written note. If you don't feel like shopping, you can make a monetary donation and Pastor Lee will buy it on your behalf.

We will package these into the 1-gallon zip top bag and deliver them to Roseville PD. As the weather changes we will add different things, for this will be a year-round, continuous ministry.

Hmong Freedom Festival Update: The outreach event we had on July 6th-7th was a success and I'll tell you why. I have a couple of stories to tell. While the children were coloring bible stories, we told them the story they were coloring. One grandmother came the first day and on the second day she brought more of her grandchildren; about nine of them total. On the second say while the grandchildren were coloring she was telling them about the story of Noah and Jesus. We asked her if she went to church and she answered, "No." We asked her how she knows about the stories. She answered, "I heard you guys telling the story yesterday." I was so excited to hear that she heard the gospel while we were telling it to the children. Second story comes from a child. We asked him if he knew who Jesus is. He said, "Of course I know who he is. "How do you know? "Google," he answered. Even Google is doing outreach.

We handed out over 200 bags filled with pencils and sharpeners, scissors, crayons, Thrivent T-Shirts, and information about our church and school. All this wouldn't be possible without the generosity of and volunteers from the members of King of Kings. We may never see the results of the gospel in these children or the parents that brought them but maybe one day one of them will be a Christian. Maybe one of them may be a pastor just like your own Pastor Lee who received the same kind of love when he was not yet a believer.



Mission Moments:

Alaska Mission team held VBS in Northway, Alaska June 17 through 21

Mission team to Northway, AK Pam Colllova, Bobbi Reyes, Don Ullman, Sarah Culbert, Shane Conklin, Ray Lentz

The 2019 Alaska Mission team consisting of 3 people from King of Kings Lutheran Church in Roseville, MN (Pam Collova, Sarah Culbert and Don Ullman) and 3 people from St Paul's Lutheran Church in Munster, IN (Shane Conklin, Ray Lentz, and Bobbi Reyes) traveled by air to Anchorage, AK on June 13 and 14. During our time in Anchorage, the team stayed overnight at Our Redeemer Lutheran Church in Chugiak, AK, located 10 miles north of Anchorage on the Glennallen Highway. Coincidently, Our Redeemer has Hmong services like King of Kings.



On June 15th the team drove to Northway through some very beautiful landscapes along the Chugach Mountains. Northway is a community of 300 people whose population is 90% native Athabascan. It is located about 400 miles north and east of Anchorage. The trip takes about 12 hours with stops for lunch, supper, gasoline and to pick up the key for Northway School. We arrived at about 7 PM at Walter Northway School which we had rented for a place for the team to stay and to hold VBS. Walter Northway was a former chief of tribe who settled the tribe in what is now Northway.

On Sunday the team attended the Northway Community Church of God. We were greeted by Pastor Tom Teasdale and his wife Jean. They were instrumental in arranging for us to come to Northway. The Teasdales have been in Northway for 35 years and are very involved in community planning. Along with the sermon by Pastor Teasdale, several native women sang songs professing their love for Jesus.

After the service we were invited to the Teasdale's house for lunch. There we met some of the local people and some of the Teasdale family who were visiting from Alabama. In native tradition we were given presents made by the local natives. Don was given a dream catcher that is supposed to catch and protect you from bad dreams. A cross was added to the center. I suppose this was to show that Jesus is always with us and protect us from danger in our lives. The rest of team was given hand-made birch bark baskets along with stuffed animals with real fur.

We held VBS Monday through Friday from 5 PM until 7:30 PM. Originally, we had planned to serve the children lunch at noon and hold VBS from 12:30 PM through 3:30 PM. On Sunday we learned that during our VBS week the Gateway School District was holding a summer program in Tok for the children to improve skills, their desire to set goals and work toward them. The dates of this program were not known until after we had made our plans for VBS. Each day the children arrived at the Northway School around 8AM and were bused to Tok, a community 58 miles west of Northway. They returned to Northway about 4 PM. This change required some quick change in plans by the team. Obviously, the children were tired by the time they arrived which made it more difficult to present our program.

During the entire week we had 29 children attend VBS at least once. The daily average attendance was about 20 children. We had been told to plan for 36 children.

The theme for the week was "God is with us in our wild ride through life". I think a better theme was "God keeps His promises." His best promise was that he would send a Savior who would totally redeem us. We used both themes throughout the week.

We began the day at 5PM with a dinner for the children prepared by Pam Collova. This was followed with our opening with a puppet skit where the children were introduced to the theme for the day. This was done using Eddy a Mountain lamb puppet (Shane was the puppeteer) interacting with Ray, a white-water rafter. (Continued...)

Sarah introduced the children to the take home point for the day and some songs. Sarah also added some object lessons in the opening that reinforced the day's message. Following the opening, Don told the Bible story for the day. Some days the children were asked to help act out the story but that didn't work well because the children couldn't remember what person they were playing in the story. After the Bible story Shane took the children outside for team games. Some of the younger children stayed with Bobbi and Pam and did sidewalk art or played on the playground. Following games, the children had a water break and were given a snack. Bobbi then led them in making a craft related to the theme for the day. Crafts were followed by music led by Sarah. At this time Sarah taught them the Bible verse for the day and action songs. We ended the day with a closing with Ray and Eddy, the mountain lamb, reviewing the story of the day and emphasizing the theme for the day.

Each day the children were given a "dog tag" keepsake that had the take home point for the day along with the Bible verse for the day. They were also given a leaflet with the printed Bible story. Hopefully when they look at these items in the future, they will remember the Bible story for that day and the take home point.

On Thursday evening we had a community dinner. Our intention was to feed the community and then then tell them what we had done in VBS during the week. Only one family attended, two grandparents and a mother. In talking with the family, we learned her son, Noah, was interested in Science particularly animals and that he read everything he could find on animals.

On Saturday June 15 the team made the long trip back to Anchorage to catch a plane back home. The team thanks everyone for their financial support and their prayers.

If we plan to send teams in June or July in the future, it would work best if each congregation sent a team of 6 volunteers. This would make it possible for each team to do planning before arriving in Alaska. To begin this planning process your interest needs to be known by the end of December. This will give us time to determine if there is enough volunteers to form a team and which month, June or July, enough people are available We also need time to raise enough funds to send the team You would not have to make a commitment until we know if there are enough people interested to form a team. 
