"He was despised and rejected by men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief; and as one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not." Is. 53:3

During Advent, we read through Isaiah 1-39 as a congregation. We will read through the rest of Isaiah during Lent. (A special thanks to Vicar Joshua Miller for preparing our readings and the questions that accompany them.) Why read Isaiah? No other prophet is quoted as often in the New Testament as Isaiah. Some people have even called his book the "Fifth Gospel!"

We will focus on the Servant songs of Isaiah during the Wednesdays in Lent. Seven centuries before the birth of Christ, Isaiah is clearly pointing to the suffering, death, and resurrection of the Messiah he was hoping for, and to whom he pointed others.

As we read and hear the prophecies for ourselves, I pray that each of us is made stronger in our conviction of what Christ has done for us. Join us at 7:00 on Wednesday nights for Evening Prayer and a message from Isaiah.

All characters in a story are either dynamic or static. A static character is one who doesn't undergo any significant change in character, personality or perspective over the course of a story. Essentially, a static character is largely the same person at the end of the story as he was in the beginning.

A dynamic character, in contrast, undergoes a major transition in one or more of these ways. It is often easier to build a compelling story around a dynamic

character. The dynamic character might go through a major life transition, have a coming-of-age experience, pull through trials and tribulations, mature, have a change of heart or develop more likeable qualities -- or take a turn for the worse. A common misconception is that a dynamic character has an electric, charismatic personality. In fact, the term "dynamic" doesn't define the character's qualities, but rather refers to how those qualities change over time.

Are we dynamic or static in this life of a Christian? The Lutheran answer is, "Yes."

On one hand you are static. As a child of God, you are the same redeemed child of God at your baptism and at death. That does not change.

On the other hand, you are dynamic. You will undergo major changes in more ways than one. You will be a witness, a living story bible to tell others. As tribulation comes your way, the God that never changes will change you to be tough and have a heart of gold. Your qualities will shine. People will gather to see what you're made of and you will tell them Who made you.

How will you be static and dynamic this month?

We minister to the needs of others as Jesus, the Vine, did during His life on earth. We feed the hungry, give water to the thirsty, entertain the stranger, clothe the naked, and visit the sick and the prisoner (Matthew 25:37-39) all in the name of Christ. In serving others, we bear much fruit and glorify God through our lives (John 15:8). We are not saved by the fruit we bear, but we have been created by God and empowered by Him to bear fruit.

May God help us all stay connected to Jesus, so that we may honor Him by serving others.

Letter from the Dicar

"Behold, the Handmaiden of the Lord": Mary as the Model Christian Disciple

A Meditation for the Festival of the Annunciation

It may seem odd to think about Mary in the middle of Lent. On March 25th, however, many Christian—including Lutherans—will celebrate the Annunciation of Jesus' conception to the Virgin Mary through the Angel Gabriel. In this story and the following events, Mary shows us what it means to be a disciple.

The first aspect of Mary's discipleship is that God gave her His grace. Mary was given the grace of God by the Holy Spirit working through God's Word. As Luther says, the grace of God given to Mary through the conception of Jesus within her womb comes to her through the preaching of God's Word. The preacher of this Word is Gabriel, but it was God's Word that worked the miracle of grace in Mary's life. This is no different than how all Christians are given God's grace: through the preaching of the Word to us.¹

The second aspect of discipleship that Mary demonstrates is her response of faith to God's Word. The Holy Spirit's work of grace through Word of God creates faith in our hearts. Mary, like all Christians, receives the gift of faith, which the Holy Spirit works in her heart through the hearing of the Word.²

Mary believes in God's promise and her cousin Elizabeth exclaims: "Blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the Lord." In the Magnificat, Mary confess her faith that God is her Savior. Her salvation and the gift of the Christ child growing in her womb are indeed one and the same. By saying that God has "looked on the humble estate of His servant," Mary acknowledges in faith that her salvation has come to her as a gift through her child.⁴

Luther uplifts Mary's trust in God her Savior as an example of faith to all Christians. For Mary, says Luther, could not see the fulfilment of God's promise to her yet, but she believed nevertheless. Mary trusted "in sure confidence," says Luther, in a promise given to her by God that was incomprehensible in its simplicity and depth.⁵ Mary shows us what it means to trust God revealed in Christ as our Savior, even though this means trusting in a promise of which we cannot yet see the complete fulfillment.⁶

But Mary's expression of her faith does not end with her own confession of God as her Savior. In the Magnificat, Mary moves beyond personal confession to sharing the Good News with others. Mary proclaims God's greatness through witnessing to His works of "scattering the proud," bringing down the mighty, uplifting the humble, and feeding the hungry.⁷

Most importantly, Mary proclaims God's faithfulness to keep His promises to His people Israel. Mary directly acknowledges, proclaims, and celebrates that God is fulfilling His promise to Abraham to bless all nations through the Son conceived within her womb. How awesome that Mary proclaims the Good News, that God will fulfill His promise to Abraham! Mary, herself, would be the vehicle for that fulfillment! (continued...)

All Christians have been commissioned by their Lord to "proclaim the Gospel to the whole creation," ¹⁰ to make disciples, and to baptize. ¹¹ The entire Church on earth bears this Great Commission of Christ in sacred trust until His return. It is no stretch, though, to say that Mary becomes not only the first Christian but also the first Christian to share the Gospel. In this way, she becomes the model for all disciples of Jesus who come after her.

Mary shows us what it means to be a disciple. I invite you to consider this view of the Virgin Mary for your own life of devotion and faith in Christ. Moreover, I invite you to follow the example of Mary, as she received God's grace, trusted by faith in God's promise, and proclaimed God's salvation to others.

What kinds of things will He do? Isaiah 43 Mar. 4 God is going to save Judah from exile and bring her people back to Jerusalem? Why? (See Is. 43:4) __Mar. 5 Isaiah 44 In Is. 44:9-20, the prophet ridicules the foolishness of those who worship idols. What are some of the things he says idolaters do? Isaiah 45 Mar. 6 In this chapter, God tells the people that He will use Cyrus as His instrument to save Judah, but that it is He the Lord who is Savior. What phrase is repeated throughout this chapter? What does this mean for us who know God in Christ? Mar. 7 Isaiah 46 In this chapter, God ridicules the failed Babylonian gods, Bel and Nebo. Babylon is soon to be non-existent. God's

righteousness is forever! How does God share His righteousness with us (see Romans 3:21-31).


