Pastor's Corner Forgiveness November 2019

"Pastor, I'm having a hard time forgiving myself." You might (or might not) be surprised at how many conversations have been had around this notion. It's a common struggle for Christians. But why? God tells us clearly that He has forgiven us in Isaiah 1: "Come now, let us reason together," says the Lord. "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red as crimson, they shall be like wool." God's use of the colors red and white give us a visual we can imagine. He assures us of the completeness of His forgiveness, that the righteousness of Jesus covers us, even when we have been caught "red-handed."

Jesus calls us to forgive each other. Easier said than done, right? Where we would set limits and personal boundaries, Jesus continually calls us to forgive, sometimes even for our own sake. When Peter asked Jesus if it was enough for him to forgive his brother seven times, Jesus tells him "No. Keep forgiving!" In Mark 11, Jesus tells us "If you hold anything against anyone, forgive him, so that your father in heaven may forgive you your sins." This echoes the thought he shared with his disciples when he taught them to pray: "And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." Perhaps we are more inclined to forgive each other if it is conditional – if God forgives us only insofar as we forgive each other? It's something to think about! When I think about the sheer volume of things God has forgiven me, I am much more inclined to forgive my brother or sister.

So God forgives us. And Jesus calls us to forgive each other, and shows us how through the cross. It's not always easy, and we might have to forgive the same person for the same sin more than once. If these things are true, why do we have such a hard time forgiving ourselves? Is it because we know ourselves better than anyone else? Is it because we knew better, but acted recklessly? Is it because we decided that in this one

situation, God would surely bend the rules for us because He would understand if He were in our situation? Is there a point when we can really excuse the inexcusable? As much as we hate to admit it, we've been there. (Continued...)

All of these things point us to the reason there is forgiveness in the first place. Life is not neat and tidy. Neither are our words, or thoughts, or actions. Sometimes we've given thought to what we are about to do. We turn the heat up on the temptation and turn it into action, even though we had sworn (to ourselves, and maybe even to someone else) that we wouldn't. Sometimes it happens so spontaneously that we even surprise ourselves. Something has gone wrong and we have broad-sided our relationship ship like a car getting T-boned at an intersection.

There may be times in your life when someone refuses your apology. They refuse to forgive. You can try any number of times, but that person is done with you. Their unwillingness to forgive is finally on their head and not yours. You may indeed have to forgive yourself because they won't. In other situations, we should be mindful of the fact that Scripture doesn't talk about forgiving ourselves. It speaks of God's forgiveness. It speaks of Christ's forgiveness as he takes our place at the cross. Brothers and sisters, we have to accept the forgiveness of God and let go of the bookkeeper in our heads, that voice that wants us to keep track of our sins. If we will gladly accept Christ's forgiveness – which is absolute – we will come to see that we don't have to forgive ourselves. We can't. It's the work of Christ. Let him do His work! He loves you. He forgives you. Believe it. It's true.

Letter From the Vicar

During the season of Thanksgiving, I often think of the petition for daily bread that we pray in the Lord's Prayer. Luther's explanation in the *Small Catechism* to this petition reminds us that everything we need in this life comes to us from the hand of God and that we live within the overarching context of gift. Luther's explanation reads:

"Give us this day our daily bread.

What does this mean? God certainly gives daily bread to everyone without our prayers, even to all evil people, but we pray in this petition that God would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving.

What is meant by daily bread? Daily bread includes everything that has to do with the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land animals, money goods, a devout husband or wife, devout children, devout workers, devout and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, self-control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like."

When we read and memorize this, we begin to recognize that all the good things in our lives come from the hand of God and are moved to thank Him for them. During this season of harvest and thanksgiving, it is fitting that we would stop the business of our month for a day, and even the business of our days for a few moments, and turn of thought to thanking the Creator for all He has done and continues to do for us.

It is also fitting that during this season we turn ourselves to help others in our community and around the world who have less than we do in this life. While sometimes when presented with the needy we may wonder if life or even God is unfair to them, another possibility lies before us: that we would become the means through which the needy receive daily bread. In his book, *Praying Luther's Small Catechism*, John Pless states, "God has arranged the world in such a way that human beings are daily bread to one another."

When I read this, my mind went immediately to what I have observed this past month as your vicar at King of Kings. I have seen generosity that astounds me. From the many hands that make light work of preparing and cleaning up at events, to open hearts that donate food, clothing, money, and time to those in need; I have observed how the members of this congregation willing serve as daily bread to their neighbors in Roseville and throughout the world.

When God's children collect canned goods at school or pack boxes at Feed My Starving Children, they are being daily bread to others. When people surprise the vicar with wonderful coats and blankets for those exiting our state's prison system, they are being daily bread to others. When members comfort each other during an illness or the loss of a loved one, they are being daily bread to one another. When the safety team keep watch during divine service, they are being daily bread to others. When church and school staff check on each other and say, "How's it going?" they are being daily bread to others. When churchgoers go from the Lord's Table and don an apron or pick up a tray to bring someone food on Thanksgiving, they are being daily bread to others.

There are too many ways in which the people of this parish are daily bread for the sake of their neighbors for me to list all of them. That does not mean, however, that they go unnoticed by others or by our Lord. This Thanksgiving, when I am thinking about those things for which I am thankful, God's people at King of Kings are right at the top of the list. Thank you for loving Christ and others by being daily bread!
