As can be expected, I am very much looking forward to vicarage where I can put many of these things into practice!

Time has certainly flown for Kari. Not only does she continue to teach her 3 and 4 year-olds each week, but she has also been given a good challenge as $5^{th}/6^{th}$ grade girls basketball coach. Her season has a few weeks remaining and her team is still looking for their first win. Nonetheless, Kari continues to grow as a coach and provides a positive influence on the girls she coaches. Aside from her school responsibilities, Kari has enjoyed a few of the "Sem wives night out" events,

As a prophet Isaiah saw the ways in which sin and pain affected the people of Israel, who were disobedient to God and His word for them. It was not pretty, to say the least. In these verses, Isaiah makes a connection between the short life of the living organisms in a broken world and the mortality of humans who are born into sin. Like the grass that dies and the snowfall that covers it, human flesh will indeed fail - the wages of sin is death (Romans 6:23). As Christ followers, we know there is something more to life than living and dying. We cling in faith to the Word of God, which endures forever. We hold on to Christ, the Word made flesh, who died, rose again, and lives and reigns for all eternity. While our mortal flesh will soon fail as the grass whithers and we succomb to the effects of sin, we can rejoice that our faith and hope rests in Christ, with whom we will live forever.
